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The Fiji National Council for Yanuyanutawa Disabled Persons scooped two awards during the human rights awards day celebration which was held on International Human rights day in December 2010.

The theme for this year's award was ''Advancing Women's Equality,

FNCDP took the special obtain award in the organization category in recognition of the research the organization conducted last year on 'Making Women with Disabilities Visible', a staff member Ms Sainimili Tawake was recognized for her leadership commitment and advancing the rights and issues of women with disabilities.

FNCDP Boss, Dr Sitiveni

received the award on behalf of FNCDP, its 34 affiliate organizations, 6 advisory committees and 18 district committee and says that 2010 has been a very constructive year for the FNCDP where it saw the signing of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities by the Government in June, the launching of the survey report on Making Women with Disabilities Visible in September, the securing of a three year funding from the European Union for Promoting Disabled Persons Equal Participation in Society and the commitment made by government for the completion of the disability centre in the Northern Division. The human rights award was organized by the Regional Rights Resource Team of the Secretariat of the Pacific Community in partnership with the Fiji Women's Crisis Centre.

PROMOTING DISABLED PERSONS EQUAL PARTICIPATION IN SOCIETY ((PDPEPS)

EU FUNDED PROJECT

The Fiji National Council for Dis- ticipation in civil society abled Persons (FNCDP) has secured a three year funding from the European Union under its European Instrument for Democracy and Human Rights (EIDHR)

The Project is to promote the equal participation of Persons with dissociety and titled abilities in "PROMOTING DISABLED PERSONS EQUAL PARTCIPATION IN SOCIETY (PDPEPS) . The overall objective is to achieve an enhanced inclusiveness of people with disabilities civil society in Fiji and to allow them to participate better and equality in the Fiji Society.

It is also to increase understanding and promote an accepting and supporting attitude of the general public and government towards people with disabilities issues, needs and concerns to enable their equal parprocesses.

The PDPEPS project will empower the organizations and bodies representing disabled people in the country, through capacity building initiatives (workshops, trainings) that will structure to enable them to better represent their members through advocacy and project activi-

The project will increase awareness among transport sector union members on the needs of persons with disabilities and how they can be best assisted. It will train medical and nursing staff, welfare and community workers, police, army and security personnel to help

understand these needs and concerns, and how they can be cared for.

And finally, the project will help drafting into law of the National Disability Policy, and advocate its subsequent enforcement that will enable the more than 10,000 people with disabilities in Fiii to more fully participate in the society as equals.

The signing of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities is an added advantage to the including the provision of education and training on the CRPD to relevant government and civil society stakeholders.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Greetings from the Secretariat

We are at the final quarter of our work calendar for 2010 and things are progressing well in the development of different processors of making disability visible in Fiji.

The major achievements so far for the disabled community and its advocates in Fiji was the signing of the UN Conventions on the Rights for Persons with Disabilities CRPD) which makes us bound in principle with this 50 article document and its optional protocol, an adjacent 18- article document that provided special provisions for challenged individual to access.

The second quarter can also be remembered for the reactivation of the Rotuma DISCOM. The third quarter provided a lot of movements for the Secretariat staff in the delivery of workshops and district meetings with the exception of Bua DISCOM.

It also released the first National Disability Survey Report that was jointly launched by the British and Australian High Commissioners

In this edition of the newsletter, it will capture the main activities undertaken by the Secretariat and some of the affiliates of FNCDP.

The highlights of the 4th quarter includes the first ever training of police officers in the northern division that was held in Labasa, Training of caregivers and capacity building

Another major milestone achieved to complete 2010 when the FNCDP family took out two awards in the RRRT organized 2010 Pacific Human Rights Awards in both the individuals and organizations categories.

LAUNCHING OF NATIONAL DISABILITY SURVEY REPORT

SURVEY REPORT LAUNCHED

Fiji National Council for Disabled Persons has officially launched a report on the findings of the Nation wide Disability Baseline /survey on "Making Women with Disabilities Visible". The launching ceremony was held at FNCDP Complex on 31st August 2010 by the British High Commissioner Mr. Mac Mclachlan in the presence of Acting High Commissioner Ms Judith Robinson, Chair person of the Fiji National Council for Disabled Persons and more than fifty guests. The survey which was funded by the British High Commission, Australian Aid for International Development (AUSAID), United Nations Development Fund for Women Pacific Regional Office, Minis-

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try of Health, Ministry for Social Welfare and Women and the Fiji National Council for Disabled Persons,

At the launching, the high level of discrimination faced by persons with disabilities in particular women and girls was highlighted. Case studies shows that people with disabilities further live in total isolations, where they face multiple discrimination and their rights violated every day of their lives.

RESEARCHERS HONOURED

A group of researchers and staff of the FNCDP were honoured during the launching of the National Disability Survey Report on "Making Women with Disabilities Visible" Both researchers and staff conducted the first ever baseline survey on disability in Fiji. They were acknowledged for their hard work, commitment and dedication during the

whole exercise and commended for braving all odds to gather statistics and information on the status of persons with disabilities. While it was a challenging task, both researchers and staff enjoyed the work as they had opportunity to visit new places and meet new friends. Furthermore they were able to learn more about Fiji. A special acknowledgement was



given to Mr Joshua Mevareka from PNG who assisted FNCDP in cleaning the data.

A lot of water has gone under the bridge in our sports development program designed to improve the wellbeing and social development of our children with disabilities in Fiji.

The introduction of our Duavata Integration Sports program saw the emergence of the Inspiring Fijian Rugby Team playing mainstream secondary schools Teams in the Suva area and Lautoka.

The program is designed to integrate our children in sports in the mainstream schools competition around the country. With our theme Building Bridges and Bringing People Together through sports. We have been able to build a complete double lane bridge from writing special schools to mainstream schools.

Members of the inspiring Fijians comprise children under 16 years who have hearing impairment and children with Intellectual disabilities. They are selected form special education schools around the country.

During the Rugby season they played the following schools in the Suva area winning two and lost 3 games.

Inspiring Fijians Vs John Wesley collegewon 16-8.

Inspiring Fijians Vs Dudley High School-Lost 13-6

Inspiring Fijians Vs Ratu Sukuna Memorial lost- 21-16

Inspiring Fijians Vs Gospel High School-Lost 10-5

Inspiring Fijians Vs. Nadroga Provincial High School-13-12

The 2010 games enabled the community to understand persons with disabilities and at the same time empowered persons with disabilities leaving them with high self esteem and a positive feeling about themselves.

2010 Paralympics Games

Over 1000 children from special education schools in Fiji and mainstream schools from the Sigatoka region participated in the 2010 Fiji Paralympics Games, held at Lawaga Park on 27th -29th October 2010. The games was organized by FPC in partnership with the FNCDP Sigatoka District Committee.

It was sponsored by Digicel and was believed to be one of the best national games ever organized. Opening the games was Ms Sarah Gouldings of the Australian High Commission in the presence of invited guests such as Makereta from the Ministry of Youth and Sports. the High Chief of Nadroga, FNCDP Director Mr. Sitiveni Yanuyanutawa and Digicel Chief Mr. David Butler.

Days program included, day one - opening ceremony; day two - athletics championship and day three - team sports competition. His Excellency the President of Fiji, Ratu Epeli Nailatikau closed the games with the emphasis that Sports is a vehicle or instrument to improve the quality of life of people with disabilities.

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PROMOTING DISABLED PERSONS EQUAL PARTICIPATION

PDPEPS ACTJVJTOES CONTINUED

INCEPTION WORKSHOP

An inception workshop was organised to raise greater awareness of the PDPEPS to all FNCDP affiliates and stakeholders. was held at the Tanoa International Hotel in Nadi from the 25th - 27th August 2010 with the following objectives;

- Familiarize major stakeholders with the project and strengthen ownership of the project by FNCDP affiliates;
- Preparation of a detailed activities implementation timeframe and work plan;
- Review initial Log frame;

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Discussing EU procurement and implementation procedures, including reporting requirements;

> Establishing a Project Coordinating Committee (PCC).

CAPACITY BUILDING

The FNCDP conducted a two day Capacity Building Workshop for its affiliate organizations at the FNCDP Complex on the 30th -31st August 2010.

With the aim of strengthening organizational and operational system within FNCDP and its affiliates organizations.

The workshop also focused in areas which included:

- · Strengthening Organizational and Operational Systems with FNDCP in relation to their affiliates.
- · Comparative procedures at similar institutions.
- Accountability and Reporting Systems.

FNDCP continues to assist Disabled Persons Organizations in providing capacity building on proposal writing skills. Approximately five Disabled Persons Organizations and three Disability Service Delivery Organizations are involved in this process.

DARWIN TRIP - The Project Officer Ms Sainimili Tawake was invited to represent the FNCDP to a three day disability consortium which was organised by Australia Disability Development Consortium in Darwin Australia from the 15th-18th September 2010. The aim of the forum was to promote the implementation of inclusive disability development in the Asia and Pacific region including the presentation of new and innovative research in the field of disability. Ms Tawake was also part of the panel which discussed disability research methodologies for the Asia and Pacific Region and her trip was funded by CBM Australia.

Factual Findings

in the northern division.

- More people acquire disability in old age that is from the age of 51 years and over with a total of 4876 with 2454 women and 2422 men.
- 41% of women with disabilities live with their families and rely on their families for livelihood and support.
- 19% of women and girls with disabilities have caregivers compared to 21% of men and
- 25% of women with disabilities acquire their disability compared to 23% of men and boys.
- 13% of women with disabilities acquire their disability through sickness compared to

10% of men and boys with disabilities.

Figure shows that over 7% of women and girls with disabilities live in institutions much more longer Western Team with Ba villagers then men and boys.

52% of people with disabilities who were institutionalised are not treated with respect by their carers.

- Whilst more women and girls with disabilities acquire primary education, there are less attainment for women which resulted to less being qualified; 48% and 52% respectively.
- 89% of the employable persons with disabilities are not employed

with 47% of men 54% and of women with disabilities.

20% of persons with disabilities suffer some sort of abuse with 12% of men and boys and 8% of women and

girls. 14% of the 20% know the perpetrator.

2% of women with disabilities have a history of unwanted pregnancy.

14% of people with disabilities live in isolation with

9% of men and boys with disabilities and 5% of women and girls.

55% of people with disabilities participate in making decisions in the family with 25% of women and girls with disabilities. These decisions are minor and are limited to issues such as food and clothing. Most decisions made are not adhered to by members of the family.

More than 60% of people with disabilities live in accessible homes. Finding showed that most

people with disabilities are adapted to their home environment which are not accessible.

- Only 10% of people with disabilities receive family assistance more than 30% finding it difficult to access the scheme.
- · People with disabilities have very low self esteem and lack the understanding and knowledge of their own human rights issues.
- There is very little awareness on disability and both people with disabilities and their families were reluctant in providing relevant information and preferred to answer selected sections of the questionnaires.
